#### **Updating our Newsletter Banner**

Welcome to the April issue of the Ipswich Unitarian newsletter with the new banner using our logo. Our Minister Lewis Connolly designed this logo soon after he joined us and we have been using it on our website

(<u>www.unitarianipswich.com</u>), on our orders of service, on our posters, and on our banner for the railings to advertise when the Meeting House is open to visitors. So it is fitting to add it now to our newsletter.

The definition of 'logo' is 'a graphic representation or symbol of a company name, trademark, abbreviation, etc., often uniquely designed for ready recognition'.

Companies are very protective of their logo because their identity is important to them and as we expand as a community too, it is important that we have a consistent logo which people also recognise. Our previous logo was designed by Nicholas Teape, who was our Minister from 1957 to 1974 and we have used it successfully ever since. The new logo updates and brings continuity to the symbols we use to represent our community.

The Ipswich Women's Festival Group aims to research and promote women's achievements and organises events and develops resources such as the local Ipswich Women's History Trail in which our minister Rev Winifred Elsie May Brown (pictured above) is featured. She was the first woman church Minister in Ipswich when appointed in 1943 – and the 19<sup>th</sup> female Unitarian Minister in the country. She worked as our Minister for three years until 1946. The trail takes you around Ipswich, marking the achievements of 21 local women. You can do the walk in two stages (1 to 9) or if you are feeling energetic as one complete walk. On the 13th February Carol, my sister Lorna and brother in law Tony and I set off for Mumbai to attend the Indian wedding of our daughter Rebecca to Imran. Imran's family lives in Thane just north of Mumbai. As it was such a long way to go, we thought a short holiday before was in order. So we stayed at the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel for a three-night stay. The hotel looked over the Arch of India right by the sea and through which the last of the British army left in 1946! The little we saw of Mumbai showed amazing contrasts ... extreme wealth and poverty, a great variety of religions living together and chaotic traffic that I do not think I could cope with. We discovered that different curry dishes could taste very delicious and guite different from what we can buy at home!

After three days of luxurious rest we went north to Thane and prepared for the wedding, which was held out of doors in the National Park just north of Mumbai. We were warned about all the wild animals that roamed in the park but fortunately did not confront any.





The outdoor venue was very colourful and all the guests wore very brightly coloured clothes. The ceremony was due to start at 6 pm but everything was so relaxed that it didn't happen until 8 pm! The ceremony itself was quite short but we had a lovely reception afterwards. This experience has whetted our thirst for more exposure to India, which we are looking to do in the coming months and years.

# Taizé Singing Group

We propose to start a Taizé Singing Group and invite all interested singers to join us in the Meeting House once a month to learn and above all to enjoy singing Taizé chants and then to form a core group for any future Taizé services.

The sessions will be led by Jan Savage and Liz Gerrie, with the first taking place on Tuesday  $16^{th}$ May from 10.00 - 12.00. Each chant will be taught mainly by ear (though we will have some reference to the music when needed.) Anyone is welcome to come along – and you do not need to be expert singer! A donation of £3 per session is suggested.

At a previous Taizé service led by Lewis and Cat, we were able to practise the chants to a degree beforehand, but because we were not able to sing all the parts, we weren't able to enjoy their full beauty, so this group will be able to form a core group to lead the singing for any future Taizé services.

The **Taizé Community** is an ecumenical monastic order in Burgundy, France, composed of over 100 brothers from Catholic and Protestant traditions. The community, though Western European in origin, has sought to include people and traditions worldwide. They demonstrate this in the music and prayers where songs are sung in many languages, and have included chants, simple phrases, often repeated and sometimes sung in canon.
