Médecins Sans Frontières/Doctors without

The Ipswich Unitarian Meeting House - proposed by Linda King

We have not done any fund-raising for our wonderful Grade 1 listed building for several years. In 2017 we look to a big expenditure to maintain the fabric of the building in good order and to reverse some of the damage done by unsympathetic repairs. I'm aware, given the high level of work necessary, the building may well attract grants from a variety of charities and local councils. However, as a congregation we should also be involved in raising the money instead of leaving it to the Trustees and Treasurer to write letters. FIND - (Families In Need) —proposed by Ann Baeppler Imagine what it would be like if there was no food to put on the table for your hungry children - let alone yourself - or if you'd used the last nappy for your baby and had no money to buy another pack. But there is a lifeline in the form of "FIND", a charity, founded 16 years ago, which provides emergency assistance to desperate families or individuals in need in and around Ipswich. During 2015 almost 3000 adults and 3000 children received aid in some form from this local charity. www.findpswich.org.uk

Talitha Koum – proposed by Tessa Forsdike
An Ipswich based Christian charity which began in
2005 with a vision to reach out with love,
compassion and practical support to women
struggling with addictions. 'Women Together' is a
self help group which meets twice a week to offer
hope, support and encouragement to women
affected by any addiction, helping them to regain the
self-confidence, self-belief and self-worth their
addiction has stolen from them.

The Hope Centre (a 14 bed dedicated residential rehab facility in Witnesham) is to be opened on 30th November, ten years after the bodies of five women murdered by a serial killer, were found in Ipswich. All of these women had a Class A drug habit. The Centre will offer women a place to begin the healing of emotional and mental scars which are left by addiction. A Registered Charity, TK is totally reliant on grants, gifts and donations for financial support. www.talithakoum.org.uk

He has been Secretary General of the Alliance of Religions and Conservation (ARC), a secular non-governmental organisation which he and His Royal Highness Prince Philip started in 1995. ARC helps religions to develop environmental and conservation projects based on their own beliefs and practices. It works with 12 major religions including over 60 different Christian traditions ranging from the Catholic Church to the New Psalmist Baptists in the USA to the Greek Orthodox Church leadership.

SPILL Festival – 26th to 30th October

The Meeting House, bathed in candlelight, was the venue for the world premiere of [NAMES] performed by Elaine Mitchener. Over 200 people attend this "durational piece which is a chapter taken from Sweet Tooth, an anthology of music/movement-art work". In this Elaine Mitchener focuses on the names enslaved Africans were given by slave owners in a deliberate, cruel and decisive action to rob them of their identity and humanity. It is a contemporary viewpoint looking back on history; it tests and challenges ways of dealing with a particularly heinous crime. Slavery was and is a crime. The three-hour long performance was exhausting, brilliantly delivered, moving and sad. The recording of the names was continuous as Elaine performed excerpts from writings of the time. There were two surnames which stood out for me (Walker and Wedderburn), could this be the catalyst to trace my ancestry?

Mitchener made good use of the space. Parts performed on the central floor were obscured from view but that did not take anything away from the overall effect. There was some breast massage going on but no nudity or profanity.

Elaine has a most beautiful voice and she used it to good effect. What stamina that woman has! Paulette Reed

More than 250,000 Syrians have lost their lives in four-and-a-half years of armed conflict, which began with anti-government protests before escalating into a full-scale civil war. More than 11 million others have been forced from their homes as forces loyal to President Bashar al-Assad and those opposed to his rule battle each other - as well as jihadist militants from so-called Islamic State. Syria – the story of the conflict – cont.

Here are bullet points from the BBC article -

- 1 in March 2011 prodemocracy protests erupted in Deraa after teenagers were arrested and tortured for painting revolutionary slogans and security forces opened fire on demonstrators
- 2 the violence escalated leading to civil war and fighting reached Damascus and Aleppo.
- 3 The UN commission of inquiry has evidence that all parties have committed war crimes (including murder, torture, rape and enforced disappearances). Civilians' suffering has also been used as a method of war.
- 4 Hundreds were killed in August 2013 after rockets filled with the nerve agent Sarin were fired at suburbs of Damascus. There is contention about who fired them.
- 5 More than 4.5 million people have fled Syria and 6.5 million are internally displaced.
- 6 So called Islamic State has capitalised on the chaos and took control of large areas of Syria and Iraq in 2014.
- 7 Only a political solution seems possible. Talks broke down in 2014. In January 2016 the US and Russia led efforts to get representatives of the government and the opposition to attend 'proximity talks' in Geneva.
- 8 What was an Arab Spring uprising has now developed into a brutal proxy war that has drawn in regional and world powers.
