Marianne Prime

Marianne was born on the 2nd March 1895 in Haddiscoe, Norfolk to William and Clara Prime, the second of what would eventually be nine children. By 1901 the family had moved to Suffolk where William had obtained a job as a horseman at Kiln Farm, Playford, just outside Ipswich. On leaving school Marianne worked as a domestic servant to a local grocer & family on Tuddenham Road, Ipswich, later training as a tailoress at Phillip & Piper's factory in Ipswich.

Ellen Alice Marianne Prime's connection with the Ipswich Unitarian Meeting House stretched from the age of 25yrs in 1920 until her death in 1988 aged 93 yrs.

Marianne, an avid reader, lived simply with her books and radio, and being a 'country girl at heart' enjoyed nature and walking in the countryside, discussion and a natter! With the encouragement of Rev Cliff Reed, she recorded in writing, her memories of her time at the Meeting House.

The following is a transcription of her account.

Memories and Reflections. E. M. Prime.

1920 - 1923.

When I joined the Unitarians in Friars Street, the Rev: Wilfred Harris, who was then the Minister, came from Adelaide, there was no Manse in those days, their furniture was brought into our old hall, and they lived there, until such time as the Rev: Harris bought a house in Jeffreys Road. I recall in those days – after our Sunday services – half of the congregation came out of the door on the right of the Meeting House, the other half came out of the door on the left, although member of this congregation belonged to the Men's and Womens Leagues, it would seem on a Sunday, they hadn't even a nodding acquaintance, they walked silently down the path into Friars Street, then each went their respective ways. Being a bookish person I was pleased to join their Literary and Social Guild, and spent many happy evenings with likeminded friends, sixteen in number. The Rev: Harris left us in 1923

and went to Dudley, after his death – judging from the appreciations written of him which appeared in the Inquirer, I realised he was one of the great intellects of his day.

1924 - 1929.

The Rev: Wallace McCubbin came in 1924, he had been a Congregational minister hitherto. This was his first Unitarian congregation, he stayed until 1929 when he retired he and Mrs Mrs McCubbin left Ipswich for St Albans leaving Marjorie their eldest daughter with us. During his ministry both the Mens and Womens Leagues flourished, and the Literary and Social Guild became more popular, especially the social side, Marjorie his daughter wrote plays as also did Fred Hamblin, whom she married later, these were performed in our old hall and always got a full house. During these years we had great fun on "All Hallows Eve", these activities attracted young people, but when we were left without a Minister one by one they ceased to join us.

1930 - 1936.

Dr John Lewis came in 1930, he was a keen [politician] and worked hard for the Labour Party, with the result, many attended our services, also others joined us who had attended his lectures on Philosophy and Psychology give at the W.E.A. For a time we had very good congregations. In 1935 the Trustees decided they would like a change of Minister, Dr Lewis was asked to resign, this he refused to do, he called a meeting of the congregation to take a vote on the matter, his side won by one vote. He stayed with us another twelve months, then resigned, and took a post with [Collonge/Gollancz?] the publishers, half of the congregation left with him. Seventeen women walked out of the Womens League, this was conducted by Mrs Lesley Lewis – his wife.

1938 - 1940

The Rev^d Joseph Burton came in 1938. He and his wife Nancy lectured for the WEA. Once again our numbers increased at our Sunday evening services.

Joseph was a keen pacifist, when war broke out he felt he must speak against it, in public on our "Corn Hill". By 1940 some of our veterans of the 1914-18 war felt enough was enough, he was asked to resign, advised by a friend to call a congregational meeting and take a vote on it. Mainly W.E.A. members came along to support him, but of course they had no voting power. Fred Hamblin stood at the door of the hall and refused to let them in, Joseph lost his temper and said "If they couldn't come in he wouldn't either". It was a pity because the congregation would have outvoted the trustees in favour of him remaining with us, the result was, he lost his job and we lost a good minister and friend. After this a number of us left, resenting the intolerance of the Trustees, myself included, especially as one of our Unitarian principle is tolerance towards others.

1943 - 1946

Hence it was when the Rev^d Winifred Brown came in 1943, straight from Oxford. The congregation had dropped to a very small number – the men folk being away at the war and others on war work. During this period the "Adult School" joined in our services, although a small company a very friendly one, and Miss Brown was greatly liked, but I think she felt frustrated and resigned in 1946 to take up a post as teacher in a school at Loughborough, she remained there until her retirement. Although she never accepted another church, she supplied [nearby] ones when the occasion arose.

1948 - 1949

The Rev^d Harold Sore became minister at Bury St Edmunds, he supplied Ipswich for Sunday morning services for twelve months, he then left Bury for Oldham, as he left his aged mother at Bury St Edmunds we saw him occasionally when he was on holiday, visiting his mother.




