

Celebrating 325 Years of Dissent: the Unitarian Meeting House in Ipswich – Friday 17th May

Plans for this conference which we are promoting in association with the University of Suffolk are going well.

The Meeting House will be open for visitors from 11am with free conducted tours by Margaret Hancock, a local Tourist Guide and with members of the congregation too to answer questions.

We then move to the Hold, the Suffolk Archives building near the University, where all the Meeting House records, and historic papers will be on secure display from 13.00 to 17.00.

There will be two presentations -

'We are now in the Tabernacle of Meeting: The Origins and Founders of the Ipswich Unitarian Meeting House' by Minister Emeritus Rev Cliff Reed.

And -

'A Comet in the System: Joseph Priestley and the Emergence of Rational Dissent in the Eighteenth Century' by Dr Elizabeth Kingston Harrison. Refreshments will be provided courtesy of the University.

The Friends of the Ipswich Unitarian Meeting House are planning a reception at the Meeting House in the early evening for all those who are signed up as Friends.

This is a special event which gives us the chance to raise our profile as a congregation and for the historic importance of the Meeting House itself to be recognised.

There is no charge for any of the event, though people will be invited to sign up for a ticket to the presentations via Eventbrite. This will help us to manage the numbers. As we go to print the link is not yet available but will be circulated by email as soon as it is set up.
