
Forget-Me Not Clubs

Thomas Becket's elbow ...

A fragment of bone has been preserved in Hungary encased in a reliquary and recently has been touring churches in the UK – including Westminster Abbey, Rochester Cathedral and other churches associated with the 12th century archbishop of Canterbury who was murdered on the assumed instructions of King Henry II. The leader of the Catholic Church in England and Wales, Vincent Nichols said "St Thomas's martyrdom reminds us what can happen when the state seeks to dominate religious belief and reshape it to its own ends, to its own selection of values. When observance of those particular values become absolute requirements then we are on a path of confrontation," Unitarians may identify with these sentiments, but perhaps be confused by the idea of relics?

New name for the newsletter?

Feedback about the newsletter name has been in favour of keeping it as the 'Ipswich Unitarian'. One reason often given was that it has only fairly recently changed from Suffolk Unitarian. So at the moment we stay with the same name.
